AMSA is a nonprofit, non-governmental organization, funded

with financial resources from the private sector in Mexico and abroad, dedicated to training Mexican physicians.

Our main ally, the Open Medical Institute (OMI), reached out to us to replicate its model in Mexico with the vision of offering continuing education for young world-class physicians.

In the eight years since we began operations in Mexico, we have worked to forge alliances with public and private health institutions, both in Mexico and abroad. These alliances, have been fundamental in developing our education model.

In December 2018 a new administration took office in Mexico. This translates into new public policies that will change the status quo. In AMSA we will continue to align ourselves with public health policies to make a contribution to better healthcare services.

According to World Health Organization, Mexico has made significant impact in recent years; total health investment has risen from 4.9% of GDP in 2000 to 5.9% in 2015, and the expenditure per capita on health grew from US\$322 in 2000 to US\$677 in 2014. The public health insurance plan financed by the Seguro Popular program now covers about 50 million individuals.

Many public policy innovations in Mexico are now being studied and emulated worldwide, especially in the field of prevention. Infant and maternal mortality rates have decreased and life expectancy is now just under 75 years of age. Despite these advances, we still face major challenges.

Of the total health expenditure in 2015, almost 60% is for cancer, ischemic cardiomyopathy and hypertension, diabetes, obesity, and renal diseases. If the epidemiological transition continues to age, we might see a major increase in these diseases and the financial burden they represent.

We are convinced that investment in human capital is the best way to promote Mexico's development with a population focused on prevention.

In AMSA we will continue to fully dedicate our efforts to working to fulfill our mission and our vision.

thousands of doctors from Central and Eastern Europe, Russia, Central Asia, Africa, and Mexico. After the fall of the Iron Curtain, the Western world realized that not only had the economies in Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union collapsed, but also the healthcare systems. Due to a lack of medication, and a deteriorating infrastructure, the people living in these newly independent states faced unparalleled low life expectancy and high perinatal mortality rates, which was intensified by a devastating brain drain of young physicians and healthcare professionals.

To help stem the brain drain Drs. Wolfgang Aulitzky and Stephen Scheidt came up with the idea to establish a medical educational program and in 1993 the first seminars in medical education were offered to doctors from the former Soviet world. The program is based on a three-step approach—knowledge transfer, experience exchange and capacity building via distance learning.

Due to the political changes in the 90s, Austria regained its historical position as the gateway between East and West, henceforth serving as a home to the Open Medical Institute. In the meantime, after 25 years, more than 22,000 physicians from 121 countries have attended more than 660 seminars on full scholarship.

More than 2,500 fellows have been awarded Observerships in Austrian hospitals. Through digital publications of the seminars, "The Medical Handbook online," Satellite Symposia and Visiting Professorships, physicians can continue to update their medical knowledge and noticeably improve the delivery of healthcare in their countries for the benefit of their patients.

On November 19, 2018, Mr. Fassman, the Austrian Federal Minister of Education, Science and Research invited Mr. Soros and the organizer of the Open Medical Institute to his ministry to celebrate the 25th anniversary of this unique educational program.

Wolfgang Aulitzky, Deans Michael Stewart and Markus Mueller thanked the many donors and faculty members for their ongoing commitment and the willingness to expand the program into other regions in need in Africa and Latin America.

In AMSA we improve the quality of healthcare services by training Mexican physicians to promote equity and wellbeing in vulnerable groups.

Together with our main ally, the Open Medical Institute (OMI), we have given fellowships to 409 Mexican physicians to attend weeklong seminars in Salzburg, Austria. In general, the fellowship recipients are specialty residents and recent graduates, although we have also awarded fellowships to leading physicians with more extensive clinical experience to introduce them to OMI's model in order to replicate it in Mexico.

The physicians who were awarded fellowships assume a Commitment with AMSA to replicate their knowledge. As a result, these physicians have trained 1,537 doctors in Mexico in two-day seminars. Our foremost ally has been Centro Médico ABC, which has opened the doors of its two Mexico City campuses to us. Also, our efforts have grown in training primary care physicians in the state of Oaxaca, reaching more than 850 practitioners (in 17 seminars), who in turn have multiplied this knowledge in their workplaces.

With a total of 1,973 physicians who have benefitted from the AMSA model, we finish up the year facing major challenges with a new federal government and a public health policy focused on first contact care.

In AMSA we firmly believe that by aligning ourselves with Public Health Policies, we will be able to contribute to facing the challenge of promoting development and improving the quality of life of the Mexican population; this requires, without a doubt, healthcare focused on prevention and quality education.

AMSA's solid reputation is based on the alliances and cooperation we have achieved with the foremost public and private health institutions in Mexico, such as Centro Médico ABC, Instituto Mexicano del Seguro Social (IMSS), Natonal Institutes of Health, High Speciality Hospitals of the Ministry of Health, Hospitals of Petróleos Mexicanos (PEMEX), Tecnológico de Monterrey, Carlos Slim Foundation and Alfredo Harp Helú Foundation, among others. It is worth highlighting that in 2018 we forged an academic alliance with Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (UNAM) to give our seminars international validity and to carry out our plans to expand the model to Latin America.

The objectives in Central Nervous System tumor management have advanced beyond radical surgical treatment, given that research in neuro-oncology have made it possible to develop holistic, multidisciplinary management strategies based on their anatomy and biology.

This seminar addressed these and other aspects of the most frequent neuro-oncological pathologies that are part of the neurosurgeon's daily practice.



In Mexico, heart ischemic diseases are the first cause of death, with a high percentage resulting from acute myocardial infarction. The severity of the problem calls for urgent attention to confront this challenge head-on through actions focused on providing effective access to health services to halt the rise in mortality from this disease and to reduce the disease burden, through these actions of training healthcare personnel.

The seminar sought to introduce students to cardiopathic knowledge, including congenital cardiopathies; as well as to address the importance of its early diagnosis and treatment.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Alianza Médica para la Salud, A.C., which includes the balance sheet as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, the statement of activities and cash flows, corresponding to the periods ended on those dates, as well as the explanatory notes to the financial statements that include a summary of the policies significant countable

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements reasonably present, in all material respects, the financial situation of the Alianza Médica para la Salud, A.C., as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, as well as the statements of activities and cash flows, corresponding to the year ended on that date, in accordance with the Mexican Financial Information Standards.

Base of opinion

We have carried out our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (NIA). Our responsibility in accordance with these standards is described later in the "Auditor's Responsibilities in relation to the Audit of Financial Statements" section of our report.
